<p>The aim of the Course is to acquaint students with the subject of the European Labour Law and freedom of movement of workers, empower them as citizens of the European Union to whom freedom of movement applies (pro futuro), and to provide them with relevant knowledge of the main principles and reasons on which labour law and social dimension of the EU are based.</p>

<i>1.4. Course description</i>		
<p>The course is designed to introduce students to EU Social Policy, EU Labour Law and the overall importance of European Social Policy to the European Programme. This will include an overview of a range of topics which comprise the subject of EU Labour Law, including EU equal treatment law, EU equal pay law, family-friendly policies, the protection of part-time and fixed-term employees and workers in GIG Economy, the regulation of working time, the safeguards for employees on the restructuring of an undertaking and collective labour law (such as the protection of the right to strike - and the limits on such a principle).</p>
