<p>The objective of this course is to develop advanced knowledge in the field of children's rights through understanding their position in the international human rights system. The course covers the historical theoretical development of the concept of children's rights, the role of UN Convention on the Rights of the Child in relation to other international UN documents, the European Convention on Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms, and the EU Charter and Fundamental Rights at regional level. The mentioned topics will be approached critically, and these topics will be analyzed and presented through a lessons and research seminar.</p>
